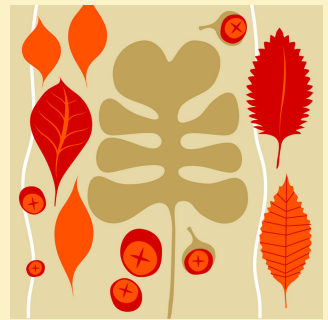

The big day is soon upon us. Chris Burgess has scheduled the crane for Thursday October 2. So, providing the weather cooperates and no other unforeseen events occur, the spire will be removed and a temporary rubber roof installed over the belfry that day.

Chris is in the process of designing a domed roof on which the weathervane can be re-placed, but that project will have to wait until at least the Spring.

Although I believe that this is the most sensible thing to do for safety and financial reasons, I teared up when Chris gave me the removal date. But, whether or not we have a sentimental and/or historic preservation attachment to the spire, its coming down can be also be viewed symbolically from a positive perspective.

I certainly don't see it on a simplistic "out with the old, in with the new," level. This all seems more a paradigm shift... yes, we voted to keep the building, but we are certainly willing to think outside of the box and begin the search for what really matters to us as a congregation. And, "out with at least some of the old" does indeed leave room for some new.

From any perspective, this is quite a thing we are doing. Thank you, to everyone. It took a combination of good sense, courage, and faith in each other as a community to get where we are, and I am proud to be a member of our congregation.

October 5: Rev. Horace Seldon—A Decade in a Change Century

October 12: Rev. Carol Allman-Morton—"The Heart of Ministry". Association Sunday is a UUA wide celebration of our shared lay and ordained ministries. It will include a special collection for UUA programs in Lay Theological Programming as well as Excellence in Ministry (scholarships for candidates preparing for ministry).

October 19: Rev. Maddie Sifantus,—*"Them Changes: Sailing the Blue Boat Home"*

October 26: "Everyday Miracles" This Sunday we will examine how we see miracle in the world and how our experience (or not) of miracle impacts our theological ideas. We will look to the historical relationships of Unitarians and Universalists with miracle and consider how this has shaped our experience and understanding of our world.

November 2: Lay-Led Day of the Dead Service.—This morning's service will be based on the Mexican holiday Día de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) in a colorful and festive celebration honoring those we have lost. This festival of candle-light vigils, processions, feasting, and fireworks blends the Roman Catholic All Saints and All Souls days with Mexican Indian traditions that are thousands of years old. We will create a communal altar so please bring a photo or other memento of someone you would like to remember. And remember to set your clocks back one hour as DAYLIGHT SAVINGS ENDS.

Worship at the Wakefield UU Church

Reverend Carol Allman-Morton: Carol grew up in this congregation and has been a member for several years. She graduated from Andover Newton Theological School and did her ministerial internship at Old Ship Church, First Parish in Hingham, MA. On June 22, 2008 Rev. Carol Allman-Morton was ordained at Old Ship Church with the Unitarian Universalist Church of Wakefield as her co-sponsoring congregation. Carol is married to Tadd Morton, also an ordained minister, and has two step children, Sam and Abbey.

During this fall Carol has agreed to preach at Wakefield UU twice a month, so you will have the opportunity to hear her on both October 12 and

October 26, and again twice in November and December. Carol is a wonderful preacher who speaks from the heart with a touch of humor.

Reverend Horace Seldon: We welcome Rev. Horace Seldon back to our pulpit on Sunday, October 5. Rev. Seldon is an ordained minister with United Church of Christ. He is a strong community activist with a variety of careers and interests. He resides here in Wakefield.

In 1968 several individuals, including Horace Seldon, created Community Change Inc. (CCI). With its mission of working against racism and for racial justice, CCI has focused on institutional manifestations of white racism. As founding director for CCI, Horace Seldon wrote a number of essays and articles on the many aspects of racism. Horace is currently involved in many other groups. To name a few:

African Meeting House, Boston African American National Historic Site Park Ranger; Part-time faculty, Boston College ; Advisory Board, Community Change, Inc.; Founding Member; Board of Directors, Fair Housing Center of Greater Boston; Board of Directors, Massachusetts Citizens Against the Death Penalty

Rev. Seldon is an amazing man with great insights and strong beliefs that he truly lives by. When he speaks of his work, he does so with deep passion and conviction.

Reverend Maddie Sifantus

Reverend Sifantus, Affiliate Minister at the First Parish in Wayland, is the founder/director emerita of the Golden Tones, a sixty member elder chorus. She retired from the Golden Tones after twenty years in August and plans to move to parish ministry. Reverend Sifantus leads worship at a number of UU congregations as well as in interfaith settings and Protestant churches, focusing on ministry with elders, music and healing, death and dying, and community ministry, as well as all the themes of liberal religion. She was ordained by and is a community minister in affiliation with the First Parish in Wayland.

A Way to Make Change

Gathering Change, Inc. is a charitable organization that collects spare change from our homes, schools, places of worship and businesses. Our mission is to meet the immediate basic needs of citizens within our communities who cannot achieve this goal alone. The funds are distributed back into our local food pantries and social programs. Gathering Change, Inc. gives everyone the opportunity to participate by sharing their abundance, thereby fostering a sense of interconnection, care and well-being throughout our neighborhoods.

During our collection week **from October 18-25**, you would invite family and friends to your home and ask that they bring their spare change to help those in need. Or you could have a party anytime that is convenient for you.

A Gathering Change Party could be: A morning coffee, an afternoon tea, a cocktail party, a game night, an early Halloween party, pizza party – you get the idea!

Responsibilities of Host: You can call for the change to be picked up or bring the change to a collection house, or you can: give guests “guesstimate” receipts, bring change to Saugus Bank on Rte 1, put it through change machine, and deposit into Gathering Change account, and record amount, town and give information to Treasurer.

You provide: A creative idea for a party within the GC bylaws, stamps for mailing the postcard invites, and light refreshments.

We provide: Gathering Change packets that include Postcard invites, GC informational brochure, tags and stickers for containers, “guesstimate” receipts, and advice, suggestions, and support.

Member and Friends are invited to participate in our ongoing mission statement and mission development/articulation project. You can read the details in the September 2008 Gleam, but here are a few major points:

A “**Mission Statement**” states who we are and why we exist.

Here is a working draft Mission Statement:

The purpose of the Wakefield Unitarian Universalist Church is to provide a progressive religious presence in our community that is nonjudgmental and welcoming.

A “**Mission**” is what we do for, or offer to the larger community.

Example: one mission of the First Baptist Church in Wakefield is housing the Wakefield Interfaith Food Pantry. One mission of the Congo Church is housing the Clothes Closet (free clothing); another is preparing and serving meals to the community at holiday times.

Note: Missions do not have to be social service oriented. Here are some questions to help narrow down Mission choices:

What are the strengths of our congregation and our members? What are the greatest needs in our larger community? What do we do? How do we bring our faith (or aspects of our faith) into the larger community?

Please write down your brainstorming ideas that describe, for you, who we are as a congregation and what we do in or for the larger community.

Wednesday evening, Oct 15, 7 - 8:30 p.m.

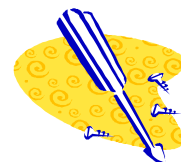

Some Notes from the Music Director



Just How Far Back Do They Go?

Some members of the audience in the Jeff

Workman/Wendy Dennis co-production of “A Celebration of Life: Katherine Workman” were startled to learn just how deep into this religion the music director’s roots extend: a third generation UU. Circumstantial evidence points that yet an earlier generation of his, hitherto before mentioned, might also have been connected with our edifice on Main Street.

Here’s what Jeff knows: his mother, Katherine Workman, was raised as a child in this church. Katherine’s mother, Gladys Miller , got involved most likely due to marriage to Harold D. Miller (Jeff’s grandfather), who was already attending. What my family suspects: that Harold belonged to this church (he grew up in Wakefield) because of his mother. We’re still researching that. Can we pinpoint a year when it all began? Not yet; but we think before the turn of the century – as in the late 1800s.

Hymn #281 talks about time as “an ever rolling stream”. If we consider our religion as that stream it’s easy to see how Jeff was swept along (kind of like in a rip tide) and found himself where he hadn’t ever thought he’d be – as the music director in the church his ancestors thrived in.

Expressions

In an expression of appreciation, members of our church choir took the music director out (at the closure of our yearly 10 week weeknight summer rehearsal session with Alla) to a local saloon for, uh, liquid refreshment

and bestowed upon him some gifts. Among them was a key chain bearing the legend “Where words fail, music speaks.”

For his mom’s memorial service a few weeks later, he hoped that his words wouldn’t fail him when he created an engaging portrait of his mom as the eulogy. But Jeff also determined that music would be the cornerstone of the service since it’s the central part of his own life. Alla graciously (and wonderfully) played; the choir was superb, singing three songs about love and a ragtime song harkening back to his mom’s birth during the Roaring Twenties. Love is, after all, eternal, and Jeff further conveyed his affection by singing a solo that spoke that he learned from his mother to fill the world with love.

Jeff would like to thank everyone for their outpouring of love and support following Kay Workman’s passing. Especially gratifying for Jeff and his family was the way the church people mobilized into a force to be reckoned with by assembling a delightful reception right after the service in the Main Hall. Jeff is also beholden to Wendy Dennis for her amazing assistance in creating the service.
